Fulbright Visiting Research Chair in Arctic Studies at the University of Washington

The Fulbright Visiting Research Chair in Arctic Studies will be open to Canadian scholars that meet the eligibility requirements of the Fulbright Program. Specifically, the Chair will be focused on issues pertaining to Arctic Studies. Scholars and practitioners are invited to apply. Research interests may include the natural sciences, social sciences, arts or humanities.

The Chair will carry out the program of research, teaching and service outlined in the successful application. The teaching requirement includes a one-quarter, 3-credit, upper division seminar focused on the applicant's research interests and appropriate to the students enrolled in the University of Washington's Arctic academic program. In addition, the Chair will provide the annual Fulbright Lecture focused on emerging issues and developments in the Arctic region, and serve on the advisory board of the polar science and policy institute to build collaborative relations with Arctic scholars, scientists, and indigenous organizations.

The Fulbright Visiting Research Chair is sponsored by the Office of Global Affairs; Division of Social Sciences, College of Arts and Sciences; Henry M. Jackson School of International Studies; and, College of the Environment.

US\$12,500 for one semester

For emerging and established scholars, post-doctoral researchers, and experienced professionals.

To conduct research, teach, or undertake a combination of these activities.

Award can be held at any University, Research Centre, Think Tank, or Government Agency in the U.S.

Minimum one semester residence at host.

Fulbright Regional Network for Applied Research (NEXUS) Program

US\$30,000

The Fulbright NEXUS Program brings together a network of junior scholars, professionals and mid-career applied researchers from Western Hemisphere nations for a series of three seminar meetings and a Fulbright residential exchange experience. Through international exchanges, seminars, and collaborative research, up to 20 Fulbright participants (1/3 from the United States, 2/3 from Canada and other countries of the Western Hemisphere) will engage in collaborative thinking, analysis, and problem-solving with a focus on improving the quality of life for communities in the region. Fulbright NEXUS Scholars will conduct individual and team-based research projects designed to generate knowledge-based, policy-oriented solutions with immediate and practical implementation potential at the local, national, or regional levels.

Program themes include: 1) Science, Technology, and Innovation, 2) Entrepreneurship, & 3) Sustainable Energy

General Eligibility Requirements

Canadian Citizenship at time of application.

Limited U.S. experience.

Doctoral degree or equivalent professional training or experience at the time of application.

Proficiency in English.

At least 5 years since last Fulbright award (lifetime maximum of 2 Fulbright Scholar awards.)

Faculty sabbatical, leave-of-absence, or retirement pay may be used concurrently with Fulbright support.

SSHRC, NSERC, and other similar awards can be held coincident with a Fulbright.

Selection is open and competitive, based on a combination of the proposed program of research, academic and professional background, personal statement, letters of reference, and adherence to the aims of the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program.

Fulbright Canada is committed to recognizing the inherent dignity and worth of every person, and to the provision of equal rights and opportunities without discrimination of any kind.
