The event, which will take place this spring, has been tentatively named 'Moving the North South: Understanding the Importance of the Provincial North in Canadian Political Economy'.

Staff Update: Welcome Gerlis Fugmann

The staff and membership of the ICNGD is pleased to welcome to its team, Dr. Gerlis Fugmann. Gerlis assumed the position of Post-Doctoral Fellow in January 2012, with the mandate to conduct comparative research in economic development patterns in the Circumpolar North.

Gerlis completed her PhD in Geography in 2011 at the Department of Geography of the Justus Liebig University Giessen (Germany). Her research focused on bottom-up economic development opportunities in Canadian Inuit regions (especially Nunavik and Nunatsiavut), after the settlement of land claim agreements in the last few decades. Gerlis has been involved with the Association of Polar Early Career Scientists (APECS) for a number of years and enjoys collaborating with researchers from around the world.

Guest Lecturer: Lassi Heininen

Prominent Arctic researcher Lassi Heininen (University of Lapland, Finland) delivered an open presentation entitled 'The New

National Arctic Strategies and their Implication for Regional Stability' as part of the ICNGD's Lecture Series on Feb. 7, 2012.

The lecture attracted U of S faculty, staff, and graduate students who had the opportunity to chat with Dr. Heininen one-onone following the presentation.

Heininen's publications include more than 100 peer reviewed and scientific journal articles as well as almost a dozen monographs. His research fields of expertise include International Relations, Geopolitics, Security Studies, Environmental Politics, and Northern and Arctic Studies. This was his first visit to Saskatchewan.

Sustainability and the North

Centre Member Karen Tanino, the lead of the UArctic Thematic Network on Food Security, is working with the ICNGD on food security, solar greenhouse technology, and sustainable energy sources for northern communities. The group is partnering with the Buffalo Narrows Economic Development Corp to examine the possibility of a biomass-heated greenhouse – an outcome of the Northern Ec. Summit working group on Boreal Wood Resources.

The ICNGD contributed to an important report on Northern education released by the Centre for the North (Conference Board of Canada) in January 2012. The report, entitled 'Lessons Learned: Achieving Positive Educational Outcomes in Northern Communities', showcases examples of innovative educational programs from across Northern Canada.

In the Northern Saskatchewan context, the report references Cree revitalization efforts, the success of the Northern Teacher Education Program (NorTEP), advances in distance education such as those made possible by Northlands College, and the ICNGD's Master of Northern Governance and Development program and its unique partnerships with industry, the provincial government, and First Nations governments.

Spotlight on Centre Member

Dr. Alan Anderson

Alan Anderson is currently a Professor Emeritus of Sociology at the University of Saskatchewan, as well as a Research Fellow in Ethnic and Indigenous Studies in the Department of Political Studies, a Research Associate of the Community-University Institute for Social Research, and an Associate Member of the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy. He chaired the International Studies Program for many years.

Alan is also a board member of Canadian Studies in Population, and works with the Australian Housing and Urban Research Institute assessing research projects in Indigenous housing—one of his main research interests. He was a Research Director of the Bridges and Foundations Project on Urban Aboriginal Housing, a CURA project funded primarily by SSHRC and CMHC. His edited book based on that project, Home in the City: Urban Aboriginal Housing and Living Conditions, will be published by the University of Toronto Press this year.

Interestingly, he has also inherited an interest in the North: his grandfather commanded northern expeditions which charted the Northwest Passage from Labrador to Hudson Bay, and later headed the Canadian Hydrographic Service. Alan is currently the lead researcher on an ICNGD research project for AANDC, developing a comprehensive literature review to support their Evaluation of the First Nation Market Housing Fund.

Cathy Wheaton of La Ronge, Saskatchewan was one of the first students to enroll in the ICNGD's new Master of Northern Governance and Development program in Winter 2011. She had been toying with the idea of continuing her studies for some time, but the right program and opportunity had not yet presented itself.

Globe and Mail Opinion Editorial of Note

On Friday, Feb. 17th the Globe and Mail printed an op ed piece penned by ICNGD Director, Greg Poelzer and University of Waterlook Professor of History, Ken Coates entitled 'We are all responsible for the plight of Canada's first nations'.

The primary message advanced by the piece was that the government and First Nations communities cannot be expected to solve the current challenges facing the First Nations peoples alone. Poelzer and Coates argued

that it was only through a collaborative and cooperative approach that we would see progress in addressing the challenges around education, housing, and social conditions.

The op ed called on community organizations, education facilities, industry, individuals, and - yes, government and First Nations - to band together and start the necessary work to effect real change.
